### NATIONAL TRAGEDY HITS CLOSE TO HOME

The tragic crash of Alaska Airlines Flight 261 on January 31, 2000 off the coast of California drew national headlines. Eighty-eight people were killed. Joseph Knight, age 54, a 1964 graduate of Bothell High School, and his wife, Linda, 51, were among the passengers. Joe and Linda were missionaries and co-pastors at The Rock Church in their hometown of Monroe. They were returning from one of their many missions to Mexico, providing sanitary water and food for children and impoverished families. They had just celebrated their 32<sup>nd</sup> wedding anniversary.

Joseph and Linda leave behind two children, a daughter, Jenny Lynn, 16, and their son, Jeff, 29, and his wife, Melinda. The children have vowed to continue their parents' crusades and fulfill their dream, which was to build a school in Mexico and teach English to the poor.

Four years after graduation from BHS, Joe and Linda were married, in 1968. Soon after, Joe left to serve with the US Air Force in the Vietnam War. To be near her husband, Linda immediately caught a plane to Okinawa, where Joe was stationed. She volunteered with the Red Cross and remained until they both returned after the war ended.

In the years that followed, their dreams of youth, which included wanting to raise their family on a ranch with quarter horses, were burdened with struggles and tribulations. The culmination was in 1978, when, after a final low, they found a new calling. The couple began their ministries with bible studies in their home, which led to opening a non-denominational church. After 13 years of operation from the family home, The Rock Church Northwest opened its doors in 1993, with a diverse membership. Their message was that you can be nothing and become somebody.

Joe and Linda realized dreams. Their children wished to follow in their footsteps. They were both Cutting Horse Champions, and raised their own quarter horses at the family's ranch.

A Celebration Service was held in their memory on February 12,

2000, attended by their many friends and supporters. Donations in support of the Knights' work with the poor in Mexico can be sent to Washington Mutual Bank at P. O. Box 70, Monroe, WA 98272.

#### A SALUTE TO THE CLASS OF 1950

It's sort of brain-boggling to think that almost 50 years have gone by since that memorable graduation day in June, 1950. Wow! After visiting with some of the people in our class and taking notes, I would say two things were the most talked about subjects of our era. First, the Great Depression of the 30's and, second, World War II.

To some, the Depression was a terrible hardship. Its far reaching effects were still apparent, even by 1950. Many local people lost their homes, and their farms and land. It's hard to believe that to many in the class of 1950, the lunch we had at school was our main (and maybe only) meal of the day. Oh, if you had ten cents (or maybe it was five cents), you could go across the street from the grade school on the hill and buy some of Mrs. Stoltzie's watered down mashed potatoes and pork and beans. She'd even let you pay next time - if she thought you would go hungry otherwise.

At home, if you didn't have some sort of wood-burning stove, heater, or fireplace, you simply didn't have any heat. Money was scarce. One classmate told me that his folks rounded up \$50.00 one August and told him to buy his school clothes for the coming year. That included a coat, shirts, trousers, under-stuff, and shoes for the full school year! It wasn't unusual for a kid to close out a school year in June and start a new school year in September wearing the same "rags."

I believe we were blessed by not having the electronics and computers of today. Our conveniences were certainly different. The eraser on my pencil was usually long gone before the pencil lead, which prompted me to spend 15 or 20 minutes at the pencil sharpener, grinding away (making noise) until the pencil simply disappeared! Back then, if you could *afford* a phone from West Coast Telephone Co. (now part of GTE), you got one of those wall-mount oak wood Kelloggs with a crank on the side. It was \$2.50 or \$3.50 a month. One ring was

for the operator and from then on, you had to pay attention to the number of rings. My phone number was 10-S-25 - that stood for line #10 - south - and our ring was 2 longs and 5 shorts! There were at least 20 homes on that one line. Teachers "logged" everything about students in their minds or wrote in a tablet. It was about 1947 or 1948 before the Reynolds Corp. introduced the ballpoint pen, which sold at \$12.95 each. What would that compare to today? I would guess at least \$100.

The hardships of World War II would be simply unbelievable to the graduates of today. There are a few things I recall other than the obvious shortages of food, gas, clothing, etc. I remember going up to Norway Hill with Billy Wheat's family to man the airplane lookout tower. We called in any and all aircraft flying over the lookout tower to a wartime center. My dad was an instructor at the B-17, "Flying Fortress" school at Boeing Field in Seattle. One time I saw his paycheck - \$100 a week! I told Billy Wheat and Fred English how much my Dad was making. They both said, "Nobody makes that much money a week, except President Roosevelt." How times have changed!

On January 20, 1945 President Roosevelt started his fourth term as president. Ninety-six days later, on April 12, he passed away at Warm Springs, GA. Harry S. Truman, Vice- President, became the 33rd president. Then Truman ran in 1948 and beat Thomas E. Dewey. On March 19, 1952 Harry S. Truman declined to be a candidate for president and Dwight D. Eisenhower went on to defeat Adlai E. Stevenson.

While the class of 1950 was just recovering from the Great Depression and World War II, on June 24th, we went to war with communist North Korea. General Douglas MacArthur was appointed Commander of the U.N. Forces in Korea. Do you remember the 38th Parallel?

What about the following 1950ish memorabilia?

- After 64 years, the Federal Tax on Oleomargarine was repealed by the U.S. Senate. Do you remember those little orange colored capsules inside the heavy plastic bag of white margarine you had to break and then knead to give it the consistency and color of butter?
- The nation's capital was 150 years old.
- The winter of 1949-50 was one of the coldest winters ever recorded in the northwest and the nation.
- The world's fastest ocean-going passenger ship ever built in the United States was the 26,000 ton ship, "Independence" (a tribute to Truman's hometown).
- A Boeing Pan-American Airways Stratocruiser set a world's non-stop flight from New York to London April 28th at 3,505 miles in 9 hours and 16 minutes.
- The right to broadcast color television was granted to both CBS and RCA
- The population in the USA in 1950 was 150,697,361. The five largest cities were New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles and Detroit.
- Joe Louis came out of retirement (retired 1949) and was defeated by Ezzard Charles in 15 rounds.
- George Bernard Shaw, age 94 years, died November 2, 1950 in England.
- Connie Mack, Manager of the Philadelphia "Athletics" baseball club, retired October 18th, after 67 years in the sport (50 years with Philly). He won 9 American League championships and 5 World Series.
- Broadway plays of 1950 included Member of the Wedding, As you Like It, Tickets Please, Call me Madam, and Guys and Dolls.
- Best Motion picture was *All About Eve*, starring Bette Davis, Anne Baxter,

Gary Merrill and a bit role by Marilyn Monroe.

- Best actor: Jose Ferrer in *Cyrano de Bergerac*. Best Actress: Judy Holiday in *Born Yesterday*.
- Some other movies of 1950 included *Mr. Music*, *Kim*, *King Solomon's Mines*, *Sunset Boulevard*, *Harvey*, and *Samson and Delilah*, to name a few.
- Best song was awarded to Mona Lisa. Other hits from "our" year were: Autumn Leaves, Bushel and a Peck, C'est Si Bon, Count Every Star, Enjoy Yourself, Chattanooga Shoe Shine Boy, Cry of the Wild Goose, Dearie, Goodnight Irene, Harbor Lights (revived from 1937), Hoop-Dee- Doo, I'd 'Ave Baked a Cake, If, It's a Lovely Day Today, Music, Music, Music, My Heart Cries for You, Ragmop, Sam's Song, Sentimental Me, Tennessee Waltz, The Thing, Third Man Theme, Wilhelmina, You, and Wonderful You, just to name a few of 62 songs that were recorded in 1950.

#### And back at Bothell High School:

There were so many wonderful teachers and administrative personnel. Who could forget S. Lyman Hilby, Mrs. McKerney, W. H. Beardsley, Miss Posey, W. A. Anderson, Chief Wurzburger, Miss McCann, Mr. Green, Mr. Cavanaugh, Ken Shutt, or "Sy" Siverson?

The last known number of graduates for this class is 162. We have not been able to locate 30 graduates and our records indicate 34 have gone to that "big cloak room" in the sky. That would leave 98 possibilities to attend our 50th Class Reunion. Won't it be wonderful to see one another again? I look forward to seeing 97 other pals and gals of the most beautiful class to ever graduate from dear old Bothell High. God Bless.

### HISTORICAL RECOLLECTIONS The Middle 1960's

The classes of 1964 and 1965 were the first *Baby Boomers* to attend Bothell High. They were also the last of the "big" classes, because the newly constructed Inglemoor High School opened its doors in September of 1965, after Bothell's Class of 1965 had graduated. Students living in the Kenmore area attended Inglemoor High after that.

First prospects of a fantastic senior year for the Class of 1964 were shattered with terrible news of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, in Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963. Much of the joy and enthusiasm for school was destroyed that day. Everyone can still recall where he or she was and what they were doing when the news of his shooting death was broadcast.

But, thanks to the resiliency of youth, the students continued their educational mission and pursued their several interests in civic matters, sports, music, and a variety of social events. It wasn't long before the renowned Beatles appeared in the US, and Bothell High students began dancing to the "Fish", the "Pony", the "Monster Mash", and, the "Jerk." Motown music became the standard. Only later, did the social-conscious and anti-war "pop" music, become notable. Vietnam, after all, in 1964 and 1965, was merely a shadow on the horizon and not the inferno of emotion and confrontation of persons that it was to become later.

Yet, the classes, as a whole, were only mildly "wild", by today's standards. Short hair on boys remained the norm, although a junior high student at Canyon Park was suspended from school for wearing his hair long, like the Beatles. Sounds ludicrous now, in light of the male hair-styles now common in many schools.

Basketball remained Bothell's highway to sports fame. Coach Larry Peterson, repeating his earlier triumph of 1962, led the Bothell Basketball Team to the King County Championship titles in 1964 and 1965! The 1965 team went on to the state championship playoffs, having won the King County Championship. They placed eighth overall, out of sixteen teams, state wide. As one class member put it, you don't have to be first, to be a spectacular success! During the 1964 - 1965 school years, Mr. Roberts, Track Coach, also initiated the exercise regime called "Isometrics" for the first time, with the Track and Field team.

In addition to sports, music continued to be an outstanding feature of Bothell High School, with many students participating in the famous Bothell Concert Band and others, in the Cadet Band. Their teacher, Bernie Ackerman, who later became the Music Director for the entire school district,

was a most tolerant and helpful instructor for all who participated in his musical endeavors. One of the more memorable incidents involving the band, was a Friday night football game where the lighting failed. Unperturbed, the band began to play, "Please Don't Take My Sunshine Away!"

The peace and quiet at BHS was suddenly shattered on April 29th, 1965 by the now famous earthquake. By coincidence, at the moment of the quake's first tremor, Mr. Wilson's physics class was in the process of studying "wave patterns" in wave boxes. Boxes of glass were suspended over work areas so that the lights above would show the shadow of the wave patterns on the work surface. The boxes began to slosh water onto the students and lights began to sway and blink! Everyone exited the school as quickly as possible, and the tremor continued long enough that those outside could still feel the earth gently swaying beneath their feet.

A Rotary Club scholarship student from France attended Bothell High that year. Yves Mosse, now a resident of Caen, France, was a 17-year old student devoid of any knowledge of the English language; however, with his own dedication and the assistance of many classmates, he became minimally conversant in English within two months! Yves, like many others, participated in debate teams, mock UN assemblies, and mock political conventions. Proving once again, that despite appearances, the average Bothell High student, took life and its challenges with some substantial seriousness.



#### RECOLLECTIONS OF A BHS EXCHANGE STUDENT

I spent the 1964 - 1965 school year in Bothell, as an exchange student. I was 17 when I arrived in August, 1964. The John Van Bertram family, who still live in Kenmore, were my hosts the first part of the year. Then, in the second half of the year, I was hosted by the Carl Knoll family, who still operate Knoll Lumber Company on Bothell Way. I had a scholarship from the Bothell Rotary Club.

I completed my senior year at Bothell High School. I did have a tough time understanding English, but it came very fast. I was graded as all students. My main courses were Math, with Mr. Bond, a great teacher, Science with Miss Conway, and English with Mr. Jones. I also took Physical Education with Mr. McGuire, and had Mrs. Magnuson for typing. On the whole, I did well. Most of my grades were A or B and I graduated in June, 1965.

My memories are numerous. The highlight was my meeting with Richard Nixon in Seattle, in October of 1964. I met him again several times in the White House and after his fall. We had a correspondence until 1996. I still think he was a great leader and played a positive role in world relations.

I fully participated in school activities while at BHS. I especially enjoyed debating, and went with the team to several other high schools. I also attended a mock United Nations meeting in Ellensburg, and closely followed our basketball team to the state championship in Longview. I learned golf, typing (it was very useful later on), and improved my English a lot. I was class treasurer and took a lot of time to fill the bank! I was active in Interact Club and helped with the "Brother's Four" concert, held in the school gymnasium in March, 1965. I attended all high school assemblies. And, of course, I was privileged to have had several girlfriends (all married now!) and school buddies that I still correspond with .

I really did not have much difficulty adjusting to American life. It was a full, hyperactive year. I had a great chance to be able to tour Washington State and the US on the way back to France. The year I spent in America deeply affected my life. I returned in 1967, 1992, 1994, 1995, and lately, in 1999, with my very own family.

My University studies in Paris, Law and Political Science, benefited by my knowledge of English and of America. I closely follow American life, listening to CNN and reading Time and Newsweek. I am most interested in American libraries and politics. I have a large library of American library books, and every time I go to the States, I go on a spending spree at Barnes and Noble.

I married late, at 38, and have two young children.. They will, of course, go to the US when they are 17. For me, America is my second "Patrie" and I feel gratitude, respect, and devotion for all your country did for freedom and peace in the world. I now live in Caen, a few miles from the Normandy landing beaches. I often go to Omaha beach and I always think of the sacrifice young Americans made for us. I love Bothell and every time I go to Bothell, I go to the high school and I am glad the school has not changed (too much!)


