# Success Against All Odds: Sandy Lantz Kleven, 1963

The *Bothell High School Alumni Association* highlights alumni because of their interesting careers or a special connection to the Bothell community. Often it is the story behind a story that is so amazing. This is what I found true in this issue's highlighted alumnus.

Sandy Lantz Kleven, Class of 1963, recalls moving to Kenmore in 1956 with her mom and six siblings. They struggled, as her mom had recently become a single parent. She started sixth grade at *Kenmore Elementary* and attended *WA Anderson* for seventh grade. They moved to Seattle for a year during the 1958-1959 school year, where Sandy attended *James* 

*Monroe.* When her mom remarried, they moved the family back to Bothell in the summer of 1959. Sandy says "Our return to Bothell was transformative, 'rags to riches.' Mom and Ken built a house on 240th that summer, up Pontius Road, left on 240th, down the hill to 7th Place. She still lives there."

Sandy continued the rest of her education in Northshore schools. Although she has many good school memories, a primary recollection is being asked to leave during her senior year in 1963 because she was pregnant. Thank goodness girls are not placed in the position of losing their education due to this today. This is why I consider Sandy an example of perseverance and dedication to improving herself and helping others even in the light of severe obstacles. I would guess she might not call them obstacles, but rather challenges.

During her school days, Sandy recalls a mock political convention at *Bothell High* in 1959 and although she was only in junior high, she was made a delegate. Fast forward, many years later, in 1977, she was a delegate to the mid-term Democratic Convention in Memphis. It was through the MPC that she met Ron Green, Bothell High Class of 1961, who became a life long friend. Through Ron, she was introduced to others and due to those connections, ended up living in New York City for a couple of years.

Other high school memories include BHS theatre and her best friend, Farrell Adrian. Farrell played "Grandma" in Edward Albee's play, *The American Dream*. Again, fast forward to the early 1990's when Sandy attended a theatre conference. She had the opportunity to meet Mr. Albee in person and asked him to sign a poster, "To Farrell, who was Grandma".

In the fall of 1963, Sandy finished her high school credits at a Seattle technical school. After the short time in New York, she came home with her two year old son and accepted what employment she could find. As fate may have it, she ran into her sixth grade "crush", Richard Kleven, Class of 1963. They dated, married, and have now spent 42 years together.

Sandy persevered and received her BA from *Western Washington University* in her mid thirties. She became a *Vista* volunteer, advocating for children in Bellingham. She created a group called *SoapBox Players* who taught abuse prevention through theater. It was during this time that she turned one of the plays into a book called "*The Right Touch*." The book still ranks near the top of Amazon.com sales for child abuse prevention books. In 1984, she went to work as an alcohol abuse counselor in Bethel, Alaska, where her family had relocated. She commented that, "I knew something about the *(Continued on page 3)*

problems, but poverty and alcohol and abuse were deeper and darker than I ever imagined."

Three years later she left Alaska, completed a masters degree at *Eastern Washington University*, and then returned to Valdez Alaska, "immersed in other people's worries." Here she wrote "*Holy Land*" and it exemplifies much of what she observed in her work. The following is an excerpt: "See babies burned up in house fires while their parents are out drinking. See the child who is sent to his parent's bed to sleep and who, reaching under his father's pillow, finds his hand gun and pulls the trigger, piercing his lower gut. It took him days to die. "One clinical social worker said of the book, "It should be required reading for new teachers, social workers, health workers, and business people in the region, because it explains so much."

In 1998, she returned to Bethel as a children's mental health clinician. A few months later, a young girl hanged herself in a remote village. Sandy was sent to help. She counseled children in classrooms, attended funerals and community meetings, and conducted de-briefings. Between 1997 and 2005, twenty Hooper Bay residents took their lives, most of them teenagers.

Sandy moved back to Anchorage in 2004 and continued to work for the *Yukon-Kuskokwim Health Corporation*. She flew across the state for weekend crisis duty. That year she met two young men who were cousins. Both had attempted suicide. The two liked to rap and perform together. Sandy made arrangements for them to perform in Seattle and Anchorage at health gatherings. They continued to go forward with their lives. Now, one is a Marine serving in the Pacific and Middle East. One wonders how someone can continue to place themselves into the depth of such despair. Maybe the story of these two boys gives her hope.

As to what Sandy has accomplished with her life, she comments, "Old friends tend to focus on the eventful life I have led, as if it is all past tense, all review from here on out. I feel that I am at the start of what I hope will be the most significant part of my life. I am involved in creative things. I have started a business promoting my work and that of other artists. I've begun to build a base of publication and awards for writing that I hope will make it easier for me to get new work in print. I am a poet and writer. My published work began in 1985, with The Right Touch, a sexual abuse prevention storybook. Next, in terms of books, is Holy Land, which is self-published, but only after appearing in the respected journal, Alaska Quarterly Review in 2006. I won a regional Emmy Award back in 1980, as writer of a docudrama, The Touching Problem. I received a Celebration Foundation grant in 2006. I have two children's book manuscripts waiting for a publisher. One, Like This, is based on a Rumi poem. The other, Attack of the Wild Ideas, is a validation of such adages as 'You can't stop an idea whose time has come.' I have also done a memoir based on time spent in Bethel, *House on the Sand*, and a novel about suicides in a village, *The Story Thief*."

Now, after 30 years in the field of Human Services, she finds hope in remaking herself with her art. She works at being a poet, playwright, painter, jewelry maker, and marketer. She loves to belly dance.

I think a well deserved life full of fun, happiness, laughter and peace are in order for this remarkable lady. I have a feeling she will never be able to get too far away from giving to and helping others!

# A Word From the Prez. Bits and Pieces

BZ Sundstrom Davis, Class of 1974, was our Chairperson again this year and, as always, did a great job in coordinating with the school and scholarship foundation to obtain the applications, organize a review committee, schedule interviews, and make notification of the selectee. I also want to thank Karen Craig MacDonald, Class of 1974 and Georgette Shogren, Class of 1977, who helped me review applications, interview candidates, and select this years' recipient. The Association truly appreciates their continued support.

Spring finally arrived. It seemed to take forever, weatherwise, with snowfall even as late as April Fool's Day. But one of the first signs of spring was, again, the opening of the *Yakima Fruit Market* on March 4th. This is the 23<sup>rd</sup> year that Stuart and Karin Pouge, both Class of 1974, have continued this tradition. And in early April, the *Seattle Mariners* opened the 2009 season with a new manager, coaches, and several new players on the roster, including the return of Ken Griffey, Jr. After the dismal 2008 season, many wondered what the new team would be like. It was a real surprise when the *Mariners* started out with a style we haven't been used to and in mid-April were leading the AL West. Not many expected this to happen. But spring is here, finally.

Empty Sideline: After 32 years as a *Seattle Times* sports reporter and columnist, Craig Smith, Class of 1963, retired at the end of December, 2008. He is also known as "Sideline Smitty." For nearly eight years, Smitty had a weekly column pertaining to high school sports. This column appeared in the Tuesday edition and he answered submitted questions (and maybe some of his own) which I looked forward to each week. sporting events. On December 23<sup>rd</sup> the *Times* published the farewell article he wrote, titled "Game Over." It was packed with great moments, people, and events he experienced over the years. In a fitting honor, Craig was recognized at halftime of the gridiron classic in November by the *Washington Interscholastic Activities Association* for his many years of service to prep sports. The sports page has not been the same since the first of the year, but we wish him the best for his retirement.

Sad news: This past winter, the community lost three noteworthy individuals that had a lot to do with shaping the Bothell and Woodinville area. Lowell DeYoung, Class of 1938, passed away peacefully on February 3<sup>rd</sup> at *Evergreen Hospital*. The DeYoung name has been synonymous with Woodinville and Lowell served the community by being involved in a number of organizations. He founded the *Lowell DeYoung Company* in 1944, which grew into a large animal feed manufacturing, retail, and delivery company. The company is still a part of Woodinville as *DeYoung's Farm and Garden*. Lowell and his wife of 66 years, classmate Stella Pascoe, were passionate supporters of many philanthropic causes. A hard worker, Lowell never really retired, but continued to work at his company up until his passing. Lowell's brother, Robert, Class of 1942, passed away unexpectedly on January 2, 2009, only about month after Lowell. Robert served his community from the 1950s through the 1970s on the Woodinville and Northshore school boards, Bothell Library board, Bothell City Council, and as Mayor of Bothell.

On December 22<sup>nd</sup>, popular Bothell businessman and community leader, Lowell Haynes, passed peacefully at *Evergreen Hospital*. He was the longtime owner-operator of *Haynes Union 76* service station on Bothell Way. Lowell was also heavily involved in the community, serving on the Bothell City Council and the Planning Commission through the years. He was a passionate supporter of youth activities, attending many sporting events and always donating for support. For many years, the coffee pot was always on at the station, which became known as "Little City Hall", where many citizens would stop by to discuss shaping the community. Although Lowell was not a Bothell High graduate, over the years he helped to shape the lives of many youth in the area. He was married to Evelyn Keeney, daughter of Pop Keeney, and had four children, all Bothell High School alumni; Allen, Class of 1963; Bob, Class of 1965; Steven, Class of 1967; and Susan, Class of 1970. With a tremendous sense of humor, he was always fun to be around.

All three of these hard-working, community-leading gentlemen are truly missed.

North Creek Schoolhouse: This past November The *City of Bothell* moved a historic building to a new city park. The *North Creek Schoolhouse*, one of the last remaining one-room schoolhouses, was moved during a winter night from its original site on 31<sup>st</sup> Ave S.E. and 228<sup>th</sup> Street in the *Canyon Park* area to the new *Centennial Park* at 11<sup>th</sup> Ave SE and 208<sup>th</sup> Street (Filbert Road) to the southwest of *Thrasher's Corner*. Property owners, the Van Natter family, donated the schoolhouse to the city for the purpose of restoration. It was built in 1902 and used as a school for eighteen years. It was then used for a number of years as a grange hall. Restoration dollars will come from the sale of the property on 31<sup>st</sup> Avenue, at the request of the Van Natter family. The front porch was removed due to deterioration, but will be replaced and a new foundation will be built. It will eventually be used as an interpretive center at the new park, which is scheduled to open this year.

# COMMUTER "VISIONARY AWARDS"

Twelve years ago, the *Visionary Awards* program was established by Community Transit to honor Snohomish County and Bothell employers that promote commute alternatives, as well as individuals who are longtime commuters.

The 2008 Visionary Awards ceremony honored Fiserve Health of Bothell as "Employer of the Year." Sabrina Combs with the City of Bothell was recognized as "ETC (Employee Transportation Coordinator)" of the year and Deborah Conley -Staerk of UW Bothell and Cascadia Community College was awarded a "SMART Commuter of the Year."

Support of Washington State's CTR (Commute Trip Reduction) goals makes a difference in the greater Bothell community.

# DOWNTOWN BOTHELL REVITALIZATION

The *City of Bothell* celebrated its 100th birthday in April, 2009. What began as a frontier town nestled near a river in 1909 has grown to a bustling community that strives to provide countless opportunities for its citizens in 2009. The city is currently working on several new projects to supplement the more recent development of the technology corridor and continue to fuel local economy and fund municipal services. Long-term plans span the next 25 years and make use of existing resources and grants to obtain goals, including creation of as many as 2,700 residential units and 650,000 square feet of commercial space to attract new businesses to a 200 acre downtown.

A major step toward revitalization goals includes a \$20.6 million dollar purchase of an 18 acre site located west of SR527 owned by *Northshore School District*. The site includes the *Anderson Building*, *NW Center Pool*, and the district's transportation facility. It does not extend to *Pop Keeney* field or surrounding recreational facilities. The Bothell City Council approved the purchase in February and

Northshore School Board followed with approval of the agreement in March. The school district will be allowed until August 2010 to relocate facilities now housed on the property and the agreement provides for the majority of the purchase price to be paid in August 2011.

The transaction will benefit the *City of Bothell*, as well as the school district and community. Proceeds will fund the district's capital construction projects to create jobs and boost the local economy. The addition of the parcel to the city will allow future expansion of SR 527, solve downtown parking needs, and provide potential for public amenities, as well as the opportunity to preserve the *Anderson Building*.

# SCOREBOARD: MISSION ACCOMPLISHED!

In the summer of 2008, George Selg, Class of 1963, and a group of committed Northshore alumni approached the *Northshore School District* with a proposal to raise money for a new multi-media scoreboard for *Pop Keeney Stadium*. This scoreboard, funded entirely through tax deductible community donations, will replace the existing 23-year old scoreboard with a state-of-the -art 18 by 25 foot scoreboard embedded with a 7 by 13 foot LED multi-media screen. George and his supporters envision this multi-media capability serving as a forum for recognizing Northshore students' athletic accomplishments. This multi-media scoreboard is the first such community sponsored scoreboard at a public high school in Washington State. The vision, dedication, and generosity of George and his many committed supporters will create a legacy of community engagement and student recognition for years to come.

The Association congratulates the committee on raising enough money for this new SCOREBOARD. The district plans some recognition - a celebration at each high school's first home football game. It is also a wonderful tribute to the class of 1963, who collectively contributed \$85,000.00 of the \$160,000.00 total needed to complete this mission.
